A Word from Our Priest

My brothers and sisters,

I bring you greetings in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Sunday, November 3rd, is All Saint's Sunday. On this day we remember those saints who have entered the Church Triumphant and we also celebrate the lives of our loved ones who now rest in the arms of our Lord. We do not deny the pain and sorrow of the loss of our loved ones. We do embrace each other in love and comfort as God continues to comfort, love, and embrace all of us.

Help us, we pray, in the midst of things we cannot understand, to believe and trust in the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, and the resurrection to life everlasting. Amen (BCP 481)

All Saint's Sunday is a joint celebration with St. Luke's and this year will be held at Grace starting 10:00 AM. It is to be noted that daylight savings time ends Sunday November 3rd as well.

We remember in our American history that people coming from England arrived here at the end of the growing season. Proper shelter, illness, and the lack of food led to a significant number of deaths. It was the indigenous people (the Wampanoag Nation) of this country that demonstrated to these newcomers how to construct proper shelter and to grow foods that would provide sustenance for them. This was so successful that in Plymouth, Massachusetts in the year 1621 the first Thanksgiving feast in America was held. Everyone was invited, and all participated at the table. This was a harvest festival in which they gave thanks to God. It is now a major national holiday.

I find an interesting correlation between the national holiday of Thanksgiving and Holy Communion or Eucharist. In fact, *Eucharist* is a Greek word which can be translated as "thanksgiving". I believe this is the real Thanksgiving. We, like the early newcomers, are subject to death because of sin. However, just as the newcomers received aid in how to live in the New World, we are given that aid by God. It is God who sent his Son to die for all of us and it is this act of love that provides for us a means to live eternally.

For this reason, the real harvest for me is the Word and receiving the Sacraments. This is a foretaste of the feast to come, the real thanksgiving. So let us celebrate the good harvest in both contexts and remember that it is even better when we share this good harvest with others.

Update on Hurricane Helene Relief

In a flurry of activity, the Casanova community and local churches quickly responded to the Warrenton Moose Lodge's urgent call for food, clothing, and equipment to help hurricane Helene's victims. Casanova residents Paul and Brandon Dawson along with Grace Church's Bryan Jacobs played a key role in the pickup and delivery logistics. They shuttled supplies from people's driveways,



garages, and porches in addition to several local churches to a staging area. Here items were consolidated into a large 48' tractor trailer. Destination: Hendersonville, N.C. *Ultimately the supplies reached 25 shelters housing over 1,200 displaced persons*. Accolades and appreciation to each and every one of you who stepped up to help our NC 'neighbors' in their unprecedented time of need.
